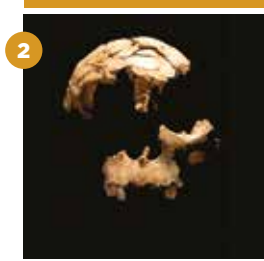




Welcome to the Museum of Human Evolution.

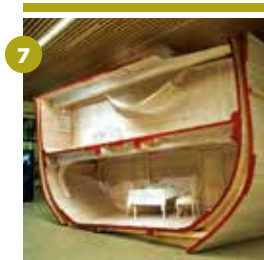
Gran Dolina child
LEVEL -1 AREA 2

Homo antecessor, 850,000 years. Gran Dolina. Frontal and maxillary bone of a child, found in 1994.



"Elvis" pelvis
LEVEL -1 AREA 3

Homo heidelbergensis, 400,000 years. Sima de los Huesos. The world's most complete pelvis fossil. Burly male, more than 45 years old.



HSM Beagle
LEVEL 0 AREA 7

Reproduction of the stern of the boat that carried Darwin on his famous journey between 1831 and 1836. Inside, his cabin is on one side and on the other, the room in his English home where he wrote his theory of evolution.

LEVEL 0 AREA 9

Homo heidelbergensis (400,000 years). Reproduction based on Skull 5 and other fossils from Sima de los Huesos. Sculpture by Atelier Daynès, Paris.

LEVEL 1 AREA 15

Reproduction of a bust of *homo neanderthalensis* by Fabio Fogliazza, based on Skull LF1. It shows a human who lived in Fumane (Italy) 44,000 years ago. He had a complex, symbolic mind which allowed him to use adornments and produce art.

Fire had a huge impact on human groups. It transformed their diet, the way they took shelter from the cold and their communication. It was a major breakthrough that facilitated sociability and environmental transformations.

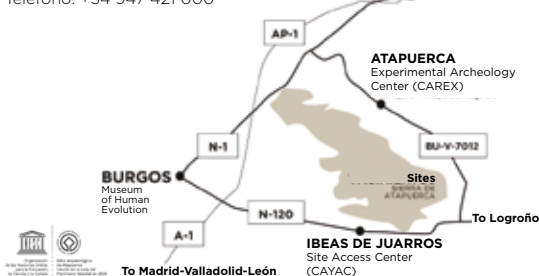

The top Level is the place for a spectacular **view of the museum**, designed by Juan Navarro Baldeweg.

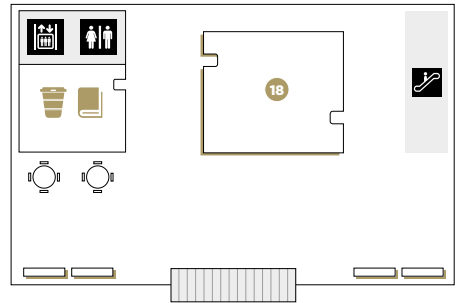

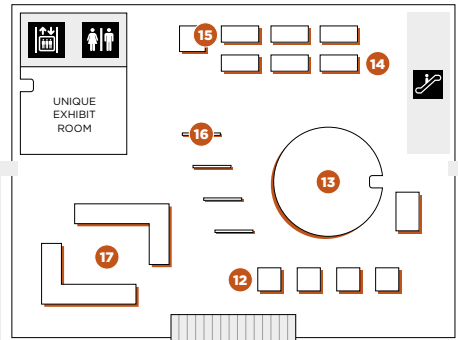

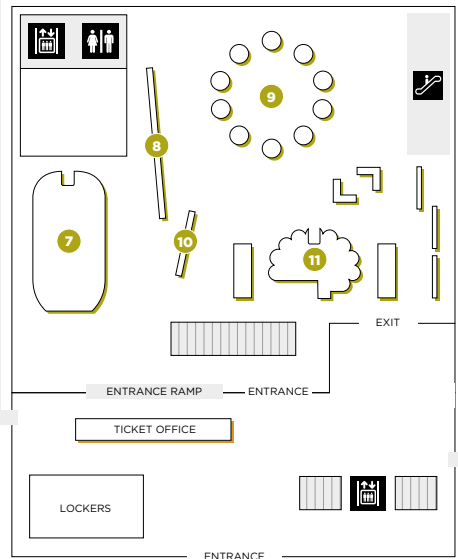
